



### LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

"Hunger is not an issue of charity. It is an issue of justice." ~ Jacques Diouf

We all deserve the nourishment of healthy food for our general well-being. Food is essential to our social systems, whether it's a neighborhood gathering or sharing intergenerational recipes with family. Unfortunately, some individuals experience circumstances that make accessing food challenging. The pandemic highlighted and exacerbated food access and distribution inequity.

The pandemic dramatically upset our food systems with impaired supply chains, school and workplace closures, and transportation disruptions. In addition, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor and Statistics, in FY22 the cost of food at home increased by 13.1% nationally and 10.9% locally. These COVID related food distribution obstacles, and the sharp increase in food prices, required adjustments to our programs and services to increase access to food for our neighbors.

In FY2022, The Pantry made the strategic decision to continue providing multiple methods of distribution, and other initiatives, implemented during COVID. Weekly In-Person Shopping, additional Mobile Pantry sites, Curbside Distribution, organic Community Garden produce and Home Delivery are now permanent. We also expanded our shopping hours to three days plus one evening per week. In 2022, for the first time in The Pantry's history, clients can have a full shopping experience weekly instead of monthly!

Keeping these multiple distribution methods and other initiatives led us to acquire a new home for The Pantry at 341 West Central St. Our new home will allow for continued development of programs and services amid increasing demand. In July of 2021 the average number of clients visiting The Pantry was 100 per week and by June of 2022 that number jumped to 154 and continues to rise.

At The Pantry we like to say, "It's not about the building, it's about what we will do in the building." With support from our community, we are committed to providing food and services to our neighbors with love, kindness and dignity. We can't wait to welcome everyone to our new home in the Spring of 2023!





### **FY22 REVENUE SOURCES**

The Franklin Food Pantry depends on a variety of revenue sources to feed our neighbors in need. The majority of our revenue comes from individual contributions collected through general giving, special events and in-kind donations. We are also grateful to our state delegation for funding statewide food insecurity initiatives.



For the second year in a row our state delegation earmarked \$50K in the MA FY22 budget for The Franklin Food Pantry.



FFP was also awarded a \$500K MA Development Grant towards renovating our new home at 341 West Central St.




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## WHAT OUR REVENUE SUPPORTS


### **FY22 EXPENSE CATEGORIES**

Almost 90% of our revenue is spent directly on feeding our neighbors. Donations are used to purchase food, process food donations, deploy staff, and manage our incredible corps of volunteers. Revenue is used to purchase fresh, frozen, refrigerated and shelf stable items at heavily discounted rates from our partners like the Greater Boston Food Bank. Our revenue also pays the utility bill for our coolers and freezers and fuels and maintains our refrigerated truck for transporting food and staging Mobile Pantries.




# OUR DONORS

**Emergency Food Bags** Emergency food is provided to anyone who comes to our door for help.


### **Community Garden Program**
